As you have symptoms suggestive of lower bowel problems, it will be necessary to examine your back passage and rectum.

Benefit of examination

The examination helps us to diagnose lower bowel problems

Alternative

None, if you do decide against having this examination, then there is a possibility of a missed diagnosis.

Risks

- Rarely bowel perforation
- Transmission of infection
- Bleeding minimal

The examination entails:

- Removing your lower garments behind the curtains
- Lie down on the couch on your back

- After a routine examination, you will be required to turn onto your left side
- Initially, examination of your bottom will be carried out
- Examination of your back passage will be carried out with a gloved lubricated finger. If this causes considerable pain, let us know and we will stop.
- A lubricated instrument sigmoidoscope will be inserted in the back passage, this will cause slight discomfort.
- Air will be used to open the bowel walls, this may cause griping pains, passage of wind or sense of defaecation.
- Please tell us if this is painful, or if you cannot tolerate this procedure, we will stop immediately

- A biopsy (specimen taken)
 may need to be carried out, if a
 problem is identified, this may
 cause slight discomfort or
 bleeding.
- Sometimes a second smaller lubricated tube (proctoscope) is inserted. This examines the anal canal area and does not require the passage of air.

Aftercare

If a biopsy (specimen) has been taken, you will receive a letter regarding the results approximately two weeks after the examination. If needed an Out Patient appointment will be sent to you.
