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How do I change my foot dressings

The podiatrist will talk you through the step by step guide and will show you how to change your dressings in between your appointments.

You will be provided with dressings and packs containing gloves, an apron and a bag for disposal. It is essential that you ensure a high standard of cleanliness at all dressing changes to reduce the risk of infection.

Please take your dressings to any appointments where your foot is being assessed.

Step by step guide

1. Wash your hands thoroughly with warm soapy water and dry them well - see the hand washing technique opposite.
2. Open the dressing pack fully onto a table to create a sterile surface and take out the disposal bag - it is important that this area is touched as little as possible.
3. Remove the old dirty dressing and place in the bag ready for disposal.
4. If possible, wash your hands again - do not walk on your foot without a dressing on. Put the apron on if you are not the patient.
5. Open all dressings required and drop them onto the sterile area. Cut any tape required to stick the dressings ready for use.
6. Put the gloves on - avoid touching the outside of the gloves as much as possible.
7. Apply the dressings to the wound - be careful to avoid touching the wound.
8. Dispose of the waste disposal bag as advised by the podiatrist and then wash your hands.

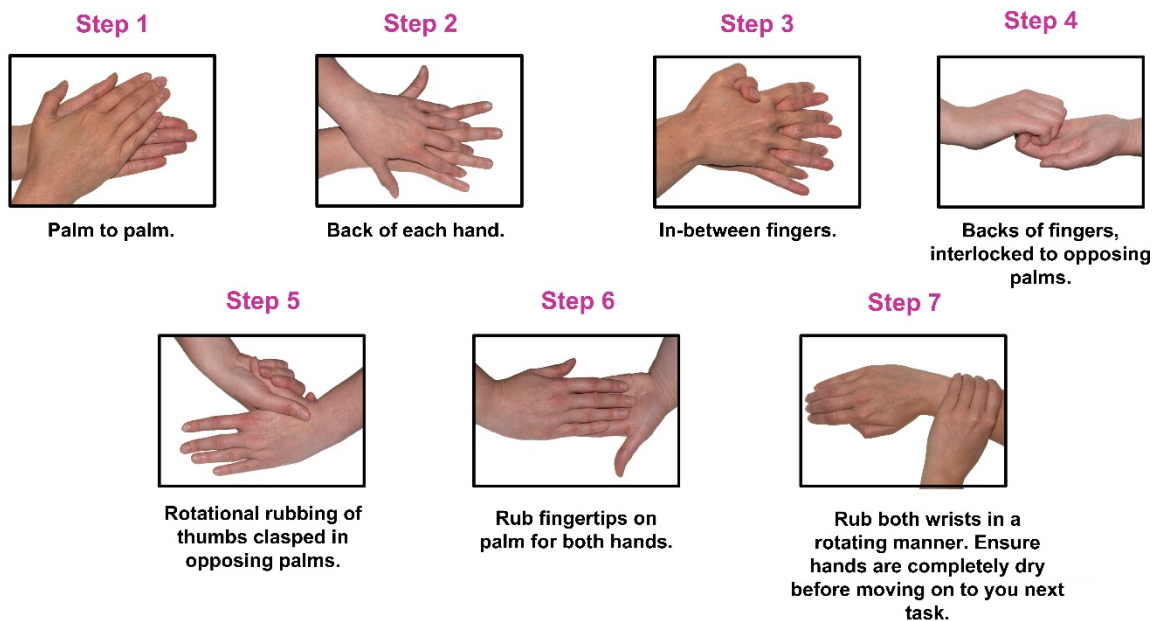
Hand Washing

Hand washing is the most important method of reducing the spread of infection.

You should therefore:

- Remove jewellery and cover any skin abrasions with a waterproof plaster
- Wet your hands with warm water
- Apply soap to your fingertips, thumbs, palms and wrists to create a lather; washing should take about one minute.
- Rinse your hands under running water and dry them with a disposable paper towel.

How can I reduce the risk of infection

- Keeping a clean home will reduce the risk of getting an infection when you have a wound; wash all surfaces that come into contact with your hands with hot water and detergent, for example door handles, bedside tables and bed frames.
- Keep your slippers clean and never walk around your home without wearing your slippers or shoes when you have a wound on your foot. Please ensure that any pets are placed in another room during dressing changes.

Any of the following require urgent attention as they may indicate infection and/or wound deterioration:

- Heat; area may become hot
- Swelling
- Increase in pain or smell
- Redness or red lines appear
- Feeling of nausea or fever
- Strike through – your dressing is extremely wet or dirty.
- Bleeding
- Unexpected rise in blood sugars if you have diabetes

Please contact your local podiatrist or seek medical attention as soon as possible.
