1 CONTROLLED DRUGS FOR INPATIENTS

- 1.1 Most prescriptions for controlled drugs will be prescribed within the HIS system and this satisfies the requirements for controlled drugs for inpatients.
- 1.2 In areas where HIS isn't being used for prescribing or at times when prescription charts are being used due to HIS not being available, further requirements exist:
- 1.3 The prescription must include, preferably in the prescribers own handwriting:-
 - 1.3.1 The name, strength, form and route of administration of the preparation.
 - 1.3.2 The dose ("take one as directed" constitutes a dose, whereas "as directed" does not)
 - 1.3.3 Frequency if prescribed as required for breakthrough pain, minimal interval for administration should be specified e.g. every 6 hours, and a maximum total quantity to be administered in 24 hours.
 - 1.3.4 A finish date, if appropriate.
 - 1.3.5 Any paper prescription must be signed and dated in black indelible ink by the prescriber prior to a supply being made against it.
- 1.4 As with all other prescribing, check that you have the correct patient by using three points of reference to confirm identity; name, date of birth, unit/NHS number.

2 CONTROLLED DRUGS ON DISCHARGE (OR FOR AN OUT-PATIENT)

- 2.1 NB: Although the trust treats diazepam, zopiclone and zolpidem as full controlled drugs for ordering and storage, they are exempt from the handwriting requirements.
- 2.2 Controlled drugs may be prescribed using electronic prescription provided the requirements detailed in paragraph 2.3 are met.
- 2.3 The prescription must include:-
 - 2.3.1 The name and address of the patient.
 - 2.3.2 The name, strength, form and route of administration of the preparation.
 - 2.3.3 The total quantity (or the number of dose units) of the preparation to be supplied in both words and figures.
 - 2.3.4 The dose to be taken (take as directed is not acceptable as a dose.)
- 2.4 Pharmacy can only supply against a printed prescription that is signed and dated in black indelible ink by the prescriber.
- 2.5 For HIS prescriptions this involves the prescriber printing off a paper copy, checking all the details are present as above and signing and dating it in ink this is often termed "a wet copy."
- 2.6 In the case of preparations (e.g. tablets, injections), the form and the strength of the preparation must be stated, along with either the total quantity (in words and figures) of the preparation or the number (in words and figures of dose units to be supplied must be written on the prescription.

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Example 1- Fentanyl patch

3 QUANTITY OF SUPPLY

Although not a legal requirement, the Department of Health has issued a strong recommendation that the quantity of controlled drugs dispensed does not exceed a 30 day supply. The pharmacy department will follow this guidance.

4 TECHNICAL ERRORS

Where a prescription for a schedule 2 or 3 controlled drug contains minor typographical error or spelling mistake or where either the words or figures (but not both) of the total quantity has been omitted, a pharmacist can amend the prescription indelibly so that it becomes compliant with legislation. Further guidance on this is found in Medicines Ethics and Practice (RPSGB, 2020.)

5 HUMAN RIGHTS ACT
